VA HOUSES LARGEST NUMBER OF HOMELESS VETERANS IN SEVEN YEARS

The Department of Veterans Affairs today announced that it permanently housed 51,936 homeless Veterans across the country in fiscal year 2025.

That number is 4,011 more Veterans than VA housed <u>last year under the prior</u> administration.

It's also VA's best performance since it began tracking the number of individual Veterans permanently housed instead of the total number of permanent housing placements, ensuring a more accurate count of the number of Veterans helped.

The Biden Administration began using this new methodology in 2022, and when applied retroactively to 2019, the numbers look like this:

[&]quot;This is life-changing and in many cases life-saving work," said VA Secretary Doug Collins. "We are proud of the progress VA is making to get Veterans off the streets and are redoubling our efforts to continue this momentum moving forward."

In May 2025, VA took bold action to reduce Veteran homelessness by launching its <u>Getting Veterans Off the Street</u> initiative, in which every VA health care system across the country hosted dedicated outreach surge events to locate unsheltered Veterans and offer them immediate access to housing programs, health care, behavioral health services, and VA benefits.

Getting Veterans Off the Street helped move 25,065 unsheltered Veterans to interim (emergency and transition) or permanent housing.

These efforts complement President Trump's May executive order to establish a <u>National Center for Warrior Independence for Homeless Veterans</u> on the West Los Angeles VA Medical Center campus. The <u>National Center for Warrior Independence for Homeless Veterans</u> aims to provide housing and support for up to 6,000 homeless Veterans from across the nation by 2028.

Every day, VA staff and community partners across the country help Veterans find permanent housing — such as apartments or houses to rent or own — often with subsidies to help make the housing more affordable. In some cases, VA teams and partners help Veterans end their homelessness by reuniting them with family and friends.

VETERANS SET FOR \$272M BOOST

More than \$272 million in potentially backlogged medical bills will be forgiven for U.S. <u>veterans</u> in a boost for ex-servicemen and women, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced.

Why It Matters

It follows recent <u>VA funding reallocations</u> aimed at strengthening <u>veteran services</u> and comes amid broader scrutiny over how VA manages its infrastructure and <u>financial</u> <u>obligations to veterans</u>.

These efforts come at a time when economic pressures weigh heavily on veterans with fixed incomes.

What To Know

Thousands of former service members will be relieved of debts that accrued due to unprocessed copayments for community care.

An unprocessed copayment is a fixed fee for a healthcare service that has not yet been posted or finalized in the billing system.

Veterans racked up debts when their copayments were paused, starting in February 2023 under the Biden Administration, because of technical issues with the VA's Program Integrity Tool (PIT) initiative, the VA said in a press release.

The PIT is an internal platform intended to accurately consolidate community care claims data and ensure proper billing to both veterans and medical providers.

It is a tool that checks incoming healthcare claims and scores them for risk by flagging claims that might be suspicious, so VA can review them before paying.

Beginning November 11, 2025, VA resumed billing for current community care copayments and guaranteed that all previously backlogged amounts accumulated during the PIT hiatus would be forgiven, according to a <u>VA press release</u>.

The relief measure is the latest in a series of funding shifts and grant programs <u>targeting</u> veteran welfare.

And VA said the measure is intended to reduce administrative burdens and stress on veteran families.

Earlier this year, the VA <u>redirected \$77 million previously slated for electric vehicle charging</u> infrastructure toward direct healthcare improvements and committed <u>\$42 million in grants</u> to organizations supporting unhoused veterans.

What People Are Saying

VA Secretary Doug Collins said: "Under President <u>Trump</u>, VA is focused on providing the best possible care and maximum convenience for Veterans, families, caregivers and survivors. Taking these steps to efficiently resolve the backlog of copayments will prevent Veterans from being blindsided with mountains of medical debt that accumulated due to problems the Biden Administration failed to solve."

What Happens Next

VA has stated it remains focused on care and convenience for veterans and will continue to respond to evolving needs amid future legislative and technological changes.

TRUMP EO REINSTATES GI BILL BENEFITS TO VETERANS DISCHARGED FOR REFUSING COVID VACCINE

The Department of Veterans Affairs today announced that potentially thousands of Veterans who were discharged from service by the Biden Administration for refusing the COVID vaccine may regain eligibility for GI Bill education benefits.

In January, President Trump issued Executive Order 14184, Reinstating Service Members Discharged Under the Military's COVID-19 Vaccination Mandate. Following that, Secretary of War Pete Hegseth directed the military departments to facilitate, among other things, discharge upgrades for individuals involuntarily separated solely for refusing to take the COVID-19 vaccine and whose service was characterized as less than fully honorable.

The Biden Administration separated more than 8,000 service members from the military because they had refused to comply with the Department of Defense (now Department of War) COVID vaccine mandate. More than half of these warriors received a discharge that was characterized as less than fully honorable, which may have made them ineligible for GI Bill education benefits.

Following Department of War reviews, 899 of these Veterans are now eligible for GI Bill education benefits, and thousands more could also regain GI Bill eligibility thanks to the executive order.

In September, VA sent letters to Veterans who have already received upgraded discharges to inform them of their potential eligibility for GI Bill education benefits. VA encourages all Veterans who were discharged from service for refusing the COVID vaccine to seek an upgraded status and apply for GI Bill benefits.

"The Biden Administration's authoritarian COVID mandates upended the lives and livelihoods of thousands of service members and Veterans," said VA Secretary Doug Collins. "We are proud to help implement President Trump's executive order and make these Veterans whole again."

"One of the most atrocious attacks on our military by the previous administration was the discharging and targeting of perfectly healthy warfighters who refused to take an experimental vaccine implemented by an illegal mandate. We must never let that happen again, and we must also right the wrongs of the past in order to restore trust. We at the Department of War and the VA are grateful for President Trump's Executive Order reinstating GI Bill benefits for those veterans who were targeted for refusing the illegal COVID-19 vaccine mandate." — Secretary of War Pete Hegseth.

What Veterans should know:

- Veterans who believe they were discharged inappropriately or believe their military
 personnel records still reflect an error or injustice (for example, separation under
 the COVID-19 mandate) may request review from a Discharge Review Board or
 Board for Correction of Military or Naval Records. For more information, visit the

- Once Veterans receive official notification that their discharge status has been upgraded to fully honorable, they can <u>submit a new education benefits claim</u> to VA.
